Theophus "Thee" Smith is a native Atlantan and an associate professor in the Religion Department of Emory University. Raised in the black church (Baptist), he now serves as an Episcopal priest at the Cathedral of St. Philip in the Diocese of Atlanta. His book, "Conjuring Culture: Biblical Formations of Black America," won the American Academy of Religion award for excellence in 1994. His scholarship spans the fields of religion and theological studies, African American spirituality, and violence studies including co-editing "Curing Violence." From Atlanta he consults and facilitates forums and workshops on reconciliation and was a co-founder of Southern Truth and Reconciliation (www.southerntruth.org).

Thee Smith's consulting expertise, workshop facilitation, and speaking engagements are available through <a href="Thurman Reconciliation Initiatives">Thurman Reconciliation Initiatives</a> (TRI) Inc., his research and education nonprofit that provides "faith-based resources for conflict transformation and social change." Professor Smith was educated at the Phillips Exeter Academy (NH), St. John's College, Annapolis, the Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, and the Graduate Theological Union, Berkeley. His academic and teaching specialties include philosophy of religion, African American religious studies, Christian theology, and religion and violence. Since 1987 he has lived and worked in Atlanta, teaching at **Emory University** in the undergraduate Department of Religion and in the Graduate Division of Religion. He is the author of Conjuring Culture: Biblical Formations of Black America (Oxford, 1994), and co-editor of Curing Violence: Essays on René Girard, (Polebridge, 1994). He is a co-founding member of Emory's initiative on Religion, Conflict, & Peacebuilding.

Prof. Smith is an occasional member of the American Academy of Religion (AAR), and a founding member of the Colloquium on Violence and Religion . COV&R is an international scholarly society dedicated to exploring the relationship between religion and violence in the generation and maintenance of culture.
